

CONQUERING THE HIGHWAY

What if weeds were our best friends?

Here we are at Stanica, the railway station abandoned for years, where trains stop again and travellers pass through an independent cultural centre. Tucked away underneath a major motorway junction, the station is one of the many third places that teem along the endless concrete infrastructure.

It is down here that, artists, castaways and so-called weeds live side by side. Called invasive are actually pioneering plants that, like our friends at Stanica, make previously inhospitable places habitable.

It is here that we will return in the spring to understand, together with the local community, how water stolen from the bridges could help pioneering plants to transform deserted spaces into places open to coexistence of living beings.

Here, where after the Fall of Berlin Wall, local authorities privatised squares to build huge shopping malls. Here, where today the city municipality is asking us to help build the new regeneration plan for the city, starting with the third spaces.
