Forewords



Frido Hinde, President 40 years of Trans Europe Halles – Happy birthday and here's to a bright future!

In 2023, we celebrated 40 years of Trans Europe Halles (TEH)! We started out in 1983 with seven members. Four decades later, our beloved network includes 165 members and associates across 43 countries.

Our birthday celebrations, which took place at Moritzbastei in Leipzig, brought together more than 300 people from across Europe and beyond. The year drew to a close with our camp meeting at Fabrica in Tbilisi – the first TEH meeting ever to take place in Georgia. I would like to thank our hosts and, of course, our Coordination Office for the successful implementation of these two wonderful events.

While our network gains new members every year and continues to grow, I am pleased to see that many people and companions from the early years remain connected to our mission and values in the role of ambassadors. Today we are a truly intergenerational network – of organisations and people. After 40 years, let us once again remember our role and our importance as a unique network of independent cultural grassroots organisations across Europe.

The process of European unification does not only take place between public institutions. Europe is also not a construct that should essentially serve the interests of profit-oriented corporations. Cooperation between civil society organisations is crucial in a united Europe. And the exchange of cultural centres makes a decisive contribution to cultural understanding.

We stand together for the values of open, democratic and diverse societies. And we stand for the vision of a peaceful Europe and a peaceful world. When the member centres of our TEH family are being destroyed in the context of war, our work and our solidarity are more crucial than ever. The ZMINA Rebuilding project by IZOLYATSIA Platform for Cultural initiatives (Ukraine), TEH and Malý Berlín (Slovakia) to support Ukrainian artists and cultural organisations is one of many great examples of how we can stand up for each other, even in times of crisis, and continue to remain true to our vision.

When TEH was launched 40 years ago, something truly great was born. We must remain steadfast in carrying on this important work to strengthen our ideals for the next 40 years and beyond.

In the early days of 2023, Les Halles de Schaerbeek – TEH's mothership in Brussels – organised a tribute event to Philippe Grombeer, the founder of our network whom many of you knew and loved and who started Trans Europe Halles with a handful of friends from Europe 40 years ago.

When we are brought close to the experience of grief, we are also brought closer to the experience of love – the ultimate legacy of the people we lose. In addition to their stories and their achievements, they also leave us with the memory of how much they believed in us, even in the hardest of times.

2023 started and unfolded not with mourning but with a celebration of this love and hope for our family, keeping us united, engaged and in solidarity, at the very moment when our brothers and sisters were being bombed and killed in Ukraine and in Gaza; when our colleagues and friends were being evicted from their centres; as extremist groups were vandalising cultural safe havens for LGBTQIA+ communities; as authoritarian governments threatened the very existence of our spaces, activities and existence; or as floods, winds, spiralling inflation and energy costs were threatening the sustainability of our centres.

Together, we created solidarity campaigns, support programmes, social justice and environmental projects ... and we will keep on doing so, come what may!

In 2023, we grew stronger than ever before, dedicating 35% of our projects' budget to our members' activities, and involving 72 members and associates in the network's diverse range of projects. We also welcomed 17 new members and young collectives at the beginning of their journey towards creating cultural centres in abandoned spaces. To encourage them and to recognise their work, we created a new award for young collectives in memory of our founder, together with Halles de Schaerbeek: the Philippe Grombeer Award.

We kept spreading the love, which for us at TEH – like life, like art or like buildings – is never something we own for ourselves, but rather something that is given to us to take care of, to collectively grow and to pass on to the next generation. Tomorrow is never certain, but even in the hardest of times, there is love, there is hope and there is the fighting spirit of dreamers, to keep all the beautiful things we have in common alive and thriving – today, tomorrow and beyond!



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In 1983, Philippe Grombeer founded Trans Europe Halles, alongside six cultural visionaries. In 2023, our vibrant network turned 40 years old – a respectable age that calls for a moment of reflection. To commemorate such an important and unique occasion, we launched the Dream, Believe, Transform campaign that was to give shape to our network's spirit, through our members' own journey, stories and moments.

Highlights

Through the lens of the Dream, Believe, Transform approach, we reflected on our past as well as setting our intention for the future. We celebrated our rich history and brought to life stories of our founding member centres and people who shaped and nurtured the network over the years. We made sure that all voices were given enough space to be heard, but we celebrated our female founders in particular!

Based on participative workshops and a design sprint conducted with our members in 2022, we

developed a new visual identity for the network and launched a new website in 2023, with a more dynamic design and new functionalities for members and audiences.

With archive material and footage collected from member centres in different corners of Europe, Dutch independent filmmaker Jan Beddegenoodts created a beautiful and moving short documentary capturing the past and present of our network. During our meeting in Leipzig (Germany), Sphere Radio broadcast onsite, together with a team of radio curators from European alternative radio stations and TEH members. They produced a live programme, which was later edited as audio capsules, retracing the history of TEH and the wider questions for the future of the cultural sector.





In Leipzig, we invited the historical figures of our network – our Ambassadors – to share their memories with us. We heard the history of TEH from the point of view of our female founders Fazette Bordage, Sabina Schebrak, and Sigrid Niemer. Cör Schlosser, founder of Melkweg Amsterdam, was our Master of Ceremony, and we partied until dawn at TEH Eurovision Sing Contest with a drink from TEH EuroBar – good old traditions that we all gladly revisited!

Membership

2023 was a pivotal year for careful growth and refinement of our membership framework. We adapted our membership criteria, enhancing clarity and transparency for prospective members seeking to join the network, and aiming to proactively make our network more diverse and inclusive.

By the end of 2023, TEH experienced a remarkable diversification, with the addition of new members and associates from many different countries and cultural backgrounds. This underscored our commitment to fostering a vibrant community that is in step with our time and our societies.

New membership application process

Before 2023, centres and organisations that wanted to join the network could express their interest at any point throughout the year. This approach resulted in a continuous influx of applications, leading to a backlog and an ever-expanding list of centres waiting for several months, or even years, to begin the membership process.

In 2023, we addressed this issue by implementing a more structured approach and establishing a specific timeframe during the year for prospective membership campaign period. During this window, prospective organisations were encouraged to submit their applications to join the network. This streamlined process ensures that all applicants receive prompt attention and evaluation, leading to a more efficient and responsive membership

Meetings

TEH organises two annual events hosted by our member centres: one TEH Conference (±400 attendees) in the late spring and one TEH Camp meeting (±200 attendees) in early autumn. Hosting two events annually remains crucial for dynamic international collaboration and they are central to our work. The meetings provide the opportunity to run surveys, needs analysis and strategic sessions to take the temperature of our sector, and to adapt our strategy to serve our members better.

All our meetings are participative, contributing to the uniqueness of our network. Their production involves a year-long preparation process and allows for concrete collaborations with our members and a deeper understanding of each other's work.

TEH#95 Conference Leipzig

From 9-11 June 2023, our annual conference took place in Leipzig (Germany), hosted by our cultural venues Moritzbastei and HALLE14. The city's transformation, spurred by an influx of residents and digital advances, reflected global concerns about climate change, especially evident in the context of the former Central German lignite mining area.

Under the theme Traditions and Transitions, the 40th anniversary conference highlighted contemporary shifts and history. Industrial heritage, digitalisation, sustainability and diversity emerged as focal points.

Attended by 300+ participants from 41 countries, the conference attracted a diverse mix of grassroots activists, public administrators, professionals from the private sector, media representatives and academics.

TEH#96 Camp Meeting Tbilisi

TEH Camp meeting #96 took place from 5-8 October in Tbilisi (Georgia) at our member centre, Fabrika, attracting 200+ attendees.

Camp

After the political, economic and ecological turbulence of recent years, and the Spring revolts in Georgia, we believed it was essential to draw breath, regroup and engage in introspection and collective dialogue about how we can collectively REBOOT. This became the theme of the event.

Proximity Office

Our Coordination Office, located in Southern Sweden, plays a central role in overseeing TEH initiatives. In 2023, as part of The Network Project (TNP), we piloted the Proximity Office initiative in Poland and France with the help of Fundacja Ziemniaki (Poland) and La Main93 (France), to explore pathways towards providing localised support to our members in various locations in Europe. The results of these pilots will inform a Proximity Office strategy in 2024, which will be implemented from 2025 onwards.





Growing interest from members has led to requests for new hubs, such as a Digital Community Media Hub and an Admin/Finance Hub.

Hubs

A hub within Trans Europe Halles is a specialised collective, composed of a group of 10 to 20 member centres, focusing on either a thematic area or a specific geographic region. These hubs act as essential connectors, serving as smaller networks that both contribute to and benefit from the larger network. Hubs play a pivotal role in enhancing TEH's ability to advocate for our members, whether on regional matters or within specific thematic areas. Additionally, the hubs serve as vital channels for staying informed about the latest developments and providing optimal support to our members.

Our Coordination Office supports the hub coordinators' efforts, grant writing and hubs operations.

Geographic Hubs

Decentralised network activities are central to a better understanding of the realities of the different geopolitical areas in our network - What are the needs of the civil society in Ukraine or in the Southern Balkans that TEH members can cater to? How can Culture help the Nordics engage in more cooperations in Eastern and Central Europe? How can we rethink our artistic collaborations, centering around the Mediterranean sea and South-South mobilities? Geographic hubs allow TEH to act in an agile, intelligent, efficient, collaborative and representative way in more than 40 countries, and address both local and global challenges.



Balkans Hub

East Hub

Launched in 2019 as an initiative by TEH members Malý Berlín in Trnava (Slovakia) and IZOLYATSIA. Platform for Cultural initiatives in Kyiv/Donetsk/ Soledar (Ukraine), The East Hub is a subnetwork of TEH for cultural centres and organisations from the Central and Eastern European region.

In 2023, the hub continued to grow and now includes 21 members from 10 different countries (Azerbaijan, Czech Republic, Georgia, Hungary, Latvia, Moldova, Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Ukraine). In 2023, to mark one year of the brutal Russian war on Ukraine, the East Hub coordinated the Ukraine Month in Europe, organising 59 events across seven countries. A total of 186 Ukrainian artists conducted and led the activities. Towards the end of 2023, the East Hub concluded its project Resource! Ukraine with resounding success and started preparations for another application for funding that was submitted to the Swedish Institute and Creative Partnerships Programme with partners from Ukraine, Georgia and Azerbaijan.

Mediterranean Hub

In 2023, the Mediterranean Hub held its first faceto-face gathering in Nicosia (Cyprus), during the Open Up festival in October. They were hosted by the NiMAC Centre and their local partners in Nicosia. During these meetings, members began to discuss ideas and plans they wanted to work on together. They also looked into ways to raise funds to support their future projects.

Before this in-person meeting, the group had often gathered online to prepare. Notable thanks are extended to Eralp Kortach from NiMAC (Cyprus) for his role in mobilising the group and facilitating the meeting. Afterwards, they continued to meet online to continue working on their plans. This helped them grow closer as a group and to feel more confident about working together on projects to bring ideas to life.

PRIORITIES.

YOUTH

In 2000, as the network was going through unprecedented hardships, a group of eight young TEH members came together and imagined a new future for the organisation. Together, they saved the network. Learning from experience, we know that young people are key to the sustainable future of organisations, infusing creative visions, ideas and new energies into the networks like ours. For this reason, TEH is committed to growing our membership and opening it up largely to youth-led organisations, to support the employment, mentorship and involvement of young people in the network's initiatives, projects and programmes, to support youth cultures, youth mobility and youth empowerment.

Youth Hub

The Youth Hub is the newest hub within the TEH network and much of the hub's work during 2023 has revolved around setting the frameworks and structures for the hub's continued work. A decision was made that the hub should primarily include member organisations that are youth-led or where young people have a strong mandate.

Organisations that carry out activities for young people are welcome as Youth Hub enthusiasts or Youth Hub supporters. The hub's coordination was taken over by Mihai Vilcea from FITT/Rotineret in Timisoara (Romania).

Project: SPOTing

2023 was the final year of the project Spaces of Transformation in Arts Education (SPOTing), which started in 2020. The aim of the project was to strengthen arts educators and reflect critically on methods and ways of working to develop and strengthen cultural pedagogy as an international field.

In the final year, the partners finalised their testbeds and shared their results through local dissemination events. Much focus was placed on completing the research report, which was conducted by Sheelagh Colclough, a Belfast-based multi-disciplinary artist and researcher. The closing seminar of the project was held in April, in Bagneux (France) hosted by the French partner Le Plus Petit Cirque du Monde (PPCM).

Programme: DUCT TAPE AND DREAMS

The Duct Tape and Dreams mentorship programme is a hands-on mentoring and capacity building programme tailored towards emerging artistic collectives. This programme engages young and dedicated creatives for several months, equipping them with essential tools and expertise needed to construct a sustainable future within the independent cultural sector.

In 2023, the programme was rebaptised and rebranded with the introduction of the Philippe Grombeer Award, created by TEH and Halles de Schaerbeek for one selected participant.

Four centres – Cotranspose (Greece}; Fundacja Ziemniaki (Poland); Objekt 4000 (Germany); and Shadows & Clouds (North Macedonia) – participated in the mentorship programme in 2023.

Project: EUROPEAN SOLIDARITY CORPS

The European Solidarity Corps (ESC) is a European Union funding programme that creates opportunities for young people between the ages of 18-30 to volunteer and run their own solidarity projects that benefit communities across Europe. It is financed by the European Commission through a €1 billion budget for 2021-2027.

The ESC aims to foster solidarity in European society, engaging young people and organisations in accessible and high-quality solidarity activities. It offers young people volunteering activities, traineeships, jobs or the ability to run their own projects. These opportunities give young people the chance to show solidarity and commitment to different communities and to help resolve challenging situations across Europe.

DIVERSITY

Europe is a multicultural, diverse continent. However, the European cultural sector remains homogenous and prone to cultural reproduction and discrimination, rather than promoting gender equality, diversity and inclusion. TEH acknowledges that adopting an intersectional approach, improving gender balance and diversity can strengthen and sustain our network. We have made a commitment to diversify our governance, communications, staff and member recruitment processes. We work closely with our members to diversify their practices, develop our knowledge, adapt our language, give more precise definitions of diversity and intersectionality, and to co-design methods for our network.



Cultural Transformation Movement Hub

The Cultural Transformation Movement (CTM) is an alliance of various art centres, production houses and cultural organisations dedicated to cultural transformation towards social justice and diversity across all aspects of their work. The CTM Hub includes more than 20 members who are committed to collaborating with under-represented and marginalised communities.

Throughout 2023, the focus of the meetings has been on re-establishing connections, discussing key issues and identifying areas for collective action. One key outcome of the collective efforts was to explore meaningful ways to link the EU-funded CTM project with the CTM Hub members.

TEH is a founding partner of the EIT Culture & Creativity, which is the ninth Knowledge Innovation Community (KIC) of the European Institute of Innovation and Technology (EIT) and the largest investment plan of the EU in the creative industries sector. In 2023, TEH received a grant to lead a mapping project of the European Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSI)-driven initiatives that have a value-based and/ or diversity-affirming approach. This mapping provided an overview of good practices and challenges and was published on both TEH and EIT Culture & Creativity's website.

Project: CULTURAL TRANSFORMATION MOVEMENT PROJECT

The Cultural Transformation Movement project (CTMP) is a four-year context-based process to diversify artistic production and its destination – starting from within the organisation itself. This TEH pioneering project aims to inspire similar efforts across the European cultural sector. Launched in March 2023, it began with research, followed by workshops on transcultural competence, diverse leadership, awareness and collective reflection. Peer learning groups were formed and the project's webpage was launched.

By prioritising social justice in arts and culture, CTM project partners are dedicated to build decisionmaking structures that reflect the diverse backgrounds and perspectives found in our societies today.

SUSTAINABILITY

Climate change affects us all. Our network consists of cultural centres housed in repurposed buildings, often with poor insulation and low energy efficiency. Since 2022, Russia's invasion of Ukraine has triggered an energy crisis in Europe, leading to utility costs rising drastically, up to 600% in some cases (PEARLE survey, 2022), exacerbating the sustainability crisis in the sector.

In October 2022, TEH joined the New European Bauhaus Initiative as an associate partner to advocate for culture in the green transition. TEH members formed the Sustainable Buildings Hub and are collaborating on various EU-funded projects aimed at environmental sustainability and the green transition of cultural and heritage buildings.

Project: REBUILDING TO LAST

Rebuilding to Last is an initiative designed to enhance the resilience and sustainability of cultural spaces and organisations, catalysing a shift towards sustainable practices within cultural teams, audiences, communities and cities. The project primarily targets building-based cultural organisations, including public cultural centres, creative hubs, theatres and museums, with the ambitious goal of engaging 3,000 organisations and 10.000 individuals.

In 2023, the project kicked off with the launch hackathon of international workshops in Berlin (Germany), inviting participation across sessions dedicated to co-designing construction workshops. The research component of the project has been structured into four phases, culminating in the first comprehensive observational study of ecological practices across Trans Europe Halles spaces.

Sustainable Buildings Hub

With 50 members from 16 different countries, the Sustainable Hub (SubHub) is the largest hub within Trans Europe Halles. The hub emphasises peerto-peer knowledge exchange, understanding and documenting members' competences and identifying external expertise needs. It is also an ideal space to build partnerships for cooperative projects. This facilitates staying updated and sharing best practices and experiences.

In 2023, the SubHub held two online meetings and two physical meetings. It launched its own Google shared folder and webpage and prepared a training programme for 2024, focusing on peer-topeer exchanges and external experts' contributions

on technical topics like: solar panels, energy efficiency, zero-waste solutions, insulation/heating, water management, ecological paints, arts and ecology.

BUILDING OUR OWN CAPACITY

Project: THE NETWORK PROJECT

The Network Project (TNP) serves as TEH's central initiative of TEH, funded by the EU network grant and co-funded by the Swedish Arts Council. It encompasses all core activities within our network, from meetings to staff exchanges to communications and advocacy efforts. As of 2023, we've entered the second year of project implementation.

Throughout this period, our focus has remained on transforming TEH towards more agile and sustainable financing, operations, and governance, expanding our knowledge on sustainable regeneration and building repurposing, and advocating for the independent arts and culture sector at local, national, and international levels.

FOCUS Staff Exchange

Our Staff Exchange programme creates opportunities for members within the network to increase and foster professional development opportunities and knowledge exchange across borders. The programme offers TEH members the possibility to share hands-on experience with another team from a similar or different cultural centre for a one- to four-week exchange. Participants gain new skills, motivation, new perspectives, strengthen their knowledge and partnerships.

TRAINING AND LEARNING

40 years of existence means 40 years of accumulated knowledge. Exchanging ideas, tips, projects and people has always been at the heart of our activities. Over time, Trans Europe Halles has developed our own methodologies to produce collective knowledge, build expertise and share it widely between each other and with wider audiences. In 2023, the network took part in several projects focused on training and learning, using these methods.

Arts Education Hub

Most of the hub's activities during 2023 happened within the framework of the SPOTing project. During the project, the participating organisations were experimenting and developing methods to increase youth involvement. SPOTing's methodology was built on a participatory action research process (PAR for short). After SPOTing was finalised, the hub coordination was taken over by TEH member A4 from Bratislava, led by Nina de Gelder, to develop new arts education projects. Warm thanks to Nina de Gelder!

Project: IRO

The International Resource Office (IRO) in Sweden provides Skåne''s cultural actors with tailored advice and support for international cultural cooperation and EU funding. It is run by TEH with funding from Region Skåne. In 2023, Marcus Lampe temporarily replaced the regular manager, Hanna Olsson, who was on maternity leave. The focus was put on expanding IRO's outreach to new target groups and geographical areas in Skåne, particularly in the fields of dance and music, and around the city of Helsingborg. Seven individuals from Skåne received funding for study trips, while three were supported to attend TEH events.

Project: EUREKA

The European Urban Regenerators Knowledge Alliance (EUREKA) had an ambition to bridge the growing gap between traditional urban planning education and the demands of the job market. Eleven partners collaborated on hands-on training for aspiring urbanists in Spain, the Netherlands, Italy, and Romania. Unlike conventional urban studies, this programme focused on developing the soft skills and expertise necessary for 60 urbanists to lead just, sustainable, and inclusive urban transformations.

Project: TRAIN THE TRAINER

Train the Trainer aimed to create a learning programme for cultural workers, fostering humancentered practices in the independent culture sector and influencing their working culture for mutual growth. Eleven cultural workers, managers and leaders participated in a year-long training programme, adopting a unique 'penguin' approach to personal leadership and organisational culture. This approach blends metaphors, movement and creativity with organisational theory and real-world practice. The training, which began in October 2022 and concluded successfully in October 2023, equipped participants to conduct workshops and initiate positive changes in their organisational environments.

DEFENDING DEMOCRACY

As wars are raging, democracies are weakening, people are displaced and inequalities are on the rise, we, independent cultural workers have a responsibility to keep spaces of dialogue open, engage the most vulnerable in our communities, safeguard independence and freedom of expression, support one another, create narratives and imaginaries for a more democratic, enviable future, and act concretely towards it. With 4 members in Ukraine, TEH has proudly supported the East Hub's initiatives to safeguard democracy in Ukraine since 2014 and will continue to do so. Today, these are growing towards new initiatives and partnerships in the South Caucasus but also in the South Mediterranean region.

Project: ZMINA: Rebuilding

In 2023, TEH, IZOLYATSIA. Platform for Cultural Initiatives (Ukraine) and Malý Berlín (Slovak Republic) launched ZMINA: Rebuilding with a €1.4 million budget to support Ukrainian artists and cultural organisations in exploring themes crucial to rebuilding the country, such as identity and infrastructure. The programme was open to independent and partnered applicants from Ukraine and Creative Europe countries.

The first wave of the national, Ukraine-based, subgrant call attracted 145 applications, with 11 projects funded for €97,658. The first wave of the international, Creative Europe-based, subgrant call attracted 86 applications, with 12 projects funded for €600,693. The second waves of both national and international calls for applications followed in 2024. Intensive capacitybuilding initiatives were also provided to enhance participants' capabilities.

STRONGER TOGETHER

Cuts in public funding, political dissension, war, gentrification and the financialisation of real estate, as well as skyrocketing energy costs has led several TEH members to experience eviction, displacement, defunding, destruction and loss of spaces. These threats facing some of us are permanent threats to all of us. Together, we are working towards building better strategies and solidarity tools and actions to defend ourselves and grow more resilient in the face of adversity. Here are a few inspiring examples from our network.



Story of Communitism from Greece

In 2023, Communitism, a TEH member from Athens (Greece), faced the challenge of their building being sold, prompting a surge of emotions and logistical hurdles. Initially exploring a purchase, they found it unfeasible. A collective ownership workshop in April and a farewell 'Wake' in May marked their adaptation process. By June, they had successfully relocated to a new space. Throughout this period, the Communitism community displayed remarkable solidarity and resilience. As they move forward, they are focused on sustainability, ecoconscious practices and fostering collaboration and creativity in their new location.

Story of Jam Factory from Ukraine

Despite the ongoing full-scale invasion of Ukraine, the Jam Factory Art Centre, a TEH member from Lviv (Ukraine), officially opened its doors to the public on 18 November 2023. Since 2015, the centre in Lviv's Pidzamche district has led the area's revitalisation efforts. Originally a spirits factory, it was repurposed by local artists and acquired by a Swiss patron. Despite war-related delays, it inaugurated in November 2023, contributing significantly to Lviv's cultural scene and community involvement. The centre remains committed to its mission of confronting contemporary challenges and fostering societal progress.

In response to the war, the centre suspended operations to ensure team safety and provided space for humanitarian initiatives. They also launched the Artists in War programme, raising almost €24,000 to support 41 artists through charity events. The centre officially opened with an exhibition reflecting on the role of art during war and its impact on individuals.

WORKING FOR THE BIGGER PICTURE

Participatory governance and advocacy for our members

Our work towards a more adapted participatory governance

Our network has grown and transformed, and our ways of working have changed. Our Articles of Association were drafted at a time when our organisation was much smaller in scale and coordinated fewer activities. The development of TEH's network's membership and volume of activities in the past 10 years led to a deep reflection on our structures of governance and management, and the necessity to adapt them to the realities of our network today, without losing the most important aspect of our governance: its participatory, bottom-up structure.

In 2022-2023, Our President, Amelie Snyers, alongside board member and future President Frido Hinde, organised consultations with the TEH members, and worked alongside TEH lawyer Dmytro Kolomoytsev to revise the Trans Europe Halles' Articles of Association. After the General Assembly voted against the new text in Leipzig, new consultations were organised to amend it. It will be revoted in June 2024 in Tartu.

Our work to build advocacy for our members

Trans Europe Halles is also an original voice, an influence, and we are often consulted for our expertise, invited to speak at events, or we proactively go meet policymakers and other stakeholders to defend our member centres whenever they need the network's support.

As part of our Network Project (TNP), we conducted three rounds of in-depth visits to our members in 2023. We supported our members and paved the way for new partnerships in Stockholm, Uppsala, Eskilstuna, Umeå (Sweden) in Tallinn, Tartu (Estonia) and Riga (Latvia) and Vinschgau-Venosta, Bolzano (Italy) and Innsbrück (Austria).

Beyond this, all year long, our board members, our Managing Director and our Coordination Office are taking the stand on behalf of our members, to promote their initiatives, defend their rights, advise on regulations and policies, and build relevant partnerships and alliances. These activities also allow us to take the temperature of our sector and understand the threats and opportunities and build the necessary foresight to adapt our strategy in the best interest of our members.

FINANCIAL TRANSPARENCY

In 2023, Trans Europe Halles has maintained the trend in financial growth that was initiated in the previous years, with an increased turnover of 32% in comparison to the year 2022.

Alongside the regional and national operational funds for the year 2023 ensured by the City of Lund, Region Skåne and the Swedish Ministry of Culture, TEH has also benefited from additional support at the national level to co-finance some of the activities of three big EU projects with a relevant role in terms of carrying out the strategic objectives and the network priorities.

On this note we refer to the activities in the framework of "The Network Project (TNP)", the "Rebuilding to Last (RTL)" project and the "Cultural Transformation Movement (CTM)" project, which together made up 58% of TEH's total turnover for 2023.

Some past EU projects continued to run and ended in 2023 and some new EU projects started, such as "ZMINA. Rebuilding", led by our Ukrainian member IZOLYATSIA, or the SUGA phase of EIT KIC, of which Trans Europe Halles is a founding member, with the "AP7-DIVERSITY MAPPING" report.

The Solidarity Fund set up in 2022 continued to operate. We transferred a total of €12,000 to members at the borders supporting Ukraine. Income from membership fees saw an increase of 5% compared to the previous year, thanks to a progressive network expansion. The volatility of the exchange rate of Swedish krona vis-à-vis the Euro also led to a gain of €42,871 in 2023.

As a result of the considerable increase in the volume of activities implemented during 2023, the total expenses have increased accordingly compared to the previous year. The increase has

impacted all the cost categories, such as the marketing costs following the launch of the new TEH website and visual identity, mission costs in relation to the network's and projects' activities including the 40th anniversary celebrations, professional services in relation to services provided by members and external organisations in the framework of project activities. Costs for TEH coordination staff has also recorded a shift of fulltime equivalent (FTE) from 8.8 in 2022 to 11.1 in 2023, with a corresponding higher cost.

72 members and associates were involved in the projects' and network's activities, with a volume of approximately €480,000.

The final result of 2023 is €39,522 in a net gain, which mainly represents the accounting revenue of the exchange rate gain.

BUSINESS BRANCH

The TEH Coordination Office and the former board of TEH, together with an advisory group composed of TEH members with business savviness and experience worked most of 2023 on the development of the business plan for the company, initially due to start in September of 2024, as presented to the members during TEH Camp Meeting 94 in Fengersfors (Sweden) in 2022 and during TEH Conference 95 in Leipzig (Germany) in 2023. The start of the company was postponed following the new board elections which took place in October of 2023.

The new board re-opened the discussion about the following point, voted by the General Assembly in Fengersfors in 2022: whether the company should be started as a new legal entity or whether it should be incubated under the TEH non-forprofit organisational structure for a few years, until it has proven to be profitable. Consultations were conducted with an external business-owner and a green transition strategy expert. The board's recommendation now is to follow a phased approach and to open new consultations with the members.



The registration of the company and the hiring of the CEO were subsequently delayed.
